




Joy to the Worlds Now Available!

How to Write More Gooder

Similar lists have been floating around for years, but here's my take on the ten critical rules to follow to get gooder at writing words and things.

- 1. Avoid any and all alliteration.
- 2. Prepositions are not words to end sentences with.
- 3. A word to the wise, avoid cliches like the plague. They're a dime a dozen.
- 4. Comparisons are as bad as cliches.

5. Be more or less specific about things and stuff.

9. Never write one-word sentences. Ever.
